
Nominations must use the electronic application (as a word or pdf document) and submit it by March 1 to Carol Tempel at carol\_tempel@bellsouth.net.

### Update on Advocacy Issues

The recent Women's March that turned into a worldwide event was supported by the American Association of University Women. The goals of the March were



consistent with the public policy of AAUW published in our 2015-2017 Public Policy brochure.

Our State President Carol Tempel spoke to more than 1,000 participants at the Columbia March where Branch President Anne Mellen and members Jamie Wurdinger and Becky Bailey were in attendance. We advocated for reproductive freedom, for civil rights for all, public tax dollars for public schools and pay equity.

Hillary Hutchinson, Dr. Jo Anne Simson, Ellie Setser and several other branch members were in the Charleston March which included well over 2,500 participants.

**Pat Wolman**, co-president of the Charleston Branch, **Doris McLallen**, president of the Greenville Branch, and **Betty Villano** from the Rock Hill Branch participated in the Washington, DC March.

We need to advocate for these positions. Women are looking for ways to express their concerns in the current political climate and AAUW offers an excellent opportunity.



In similar circumstances throughout the day, we met marchers from CT to CA and everywhere in between. J.R. and I managed to squeeze into the crowd at the side of a Jumbotron to see the opening ceremonies. There was much cheering and chanting and a myriad of signs and topics of interest and concern to women and families. What no one knew was that 55 speakers had each been given one minute to speak. After almost two hours, and a few needing to be taken out due to claustrophobia, the porta-potties called
