This is the year to truly get involved in advocacy

This year will bring many opportunities for us in AAUW to educate ourselves about SC's legislative and judicial processes.

We will again participate in a *Legislative Day Conference* in February 2011 with the League of Women Voters and the School Improvement Council.

This year we will be able to join with these same groups in regional *Advocacy Workshops* to help train us in the advocacy process. Too often people attend the Legislative Day Conference and then go home before attempting to contact their legislators to express their opinions. Educating ourselves should be only the first step in affecting the outcome of the use of ever-scarcer public resources for education.

The AAUW of SC Board voted to cosponsor the League of Women Voter's *Conference on Ensuring An Independent and Diverse Judiciary* to be held at the Charleston Museum, 360 Meeting Street, Friday, October 8, 2010. Women and African Americans make up a much larger percentage of the population than are represented in our State's judiciary. We will join with the League in exploring how we might remedy this situation.

A free reception will follow the meeting. The program for the event can be found to the right. There is no cost to participants and the Charleston Branch will offer home hospitality to AAUW of SC members who are attending on a first come, first served basis. Call 843-571-3417 for making reservations.

Of special concern to everyone should be the rapid escalation of tuition to our State Colleges and Universities. Almost as soon as lottery money was available to these institutions for scholarships, tuition increased. We must pay attention to be sure that the decreased funding of higher education in this state by the legislature is not given as reason to increase the cost to students. We need to be sure that funding available is used wisely to support faculty and students instead of for amenities that are not really a necessary part of an education. Middle class families are increasingly unable to afford the highest public college costs in the South.

Breaking News: AAUW of SC wins First & Third Place in Top 10 Awards

We have very good news to share. AAUW-SC has achieved First Place in the 2009 Top Ten Award for State Per Capita Giving to the Educational Opportunities Fund. Congratulations to everyone who contributed.

AAUW of SC has also been awarded Third Place for State Per Capita Giving in Combined Support to all programmatic areas for 2009.

Let's keep the momentum going for 2010. Remember to send in your contributions to AAUW before December 31st of this calendar year for the donations to count for 2010 and for you to have your named gift awards ready at our convention.

At our 2009 convention, Trish reported \$16,900 had been raised for the Betty Bayless Projects and Research Grant. This allowed the state to have \$1,500 in named gift awards. These awards were presented to Beverly James, President of

AAUW- SC (\$1000) and the League of Women Voters of South Carolina (\$500.).

about her participation in the AAUW National Conference of College Women Student Leaders.

All AAUW members' voices will now be heard at Convention

Delegates and members at the 2009 AAUW Convention approved changes to the AAUW Bylaws that enabled all AAUW members (whether or not they attend the convention) to elect candidates for the AAUW Board of Directors and vote on other items of business such as bylaws amendments, resolutions, and the Public Policy Program.

Previously, the above activities occurred during the convention. With the bylaws change, they now occur before the convention.

President Commemorates Women's Equality Day and supports Paycheck Fairness Act – push is on to pass this act in September

Thursday, August 26, *Women's Equality Day*, marked the 90th anniversary of women's suffrage in the United States.

President Barack Obama issued a proclamation, calling specifically for passage of the *Paycheck Fairness Act*. Additionally, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) issued a statement honoring the suffrage movement and acknowledging the economic equity battles that persist. She wrote, "Nine decades after the 19th amendment took effect, our journey for equality goes on."

Thanks to the hard work of AAUW *Action Network* members and our coalition partners, President Obama signed the *Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act* into law on Jan. 29, 2009. However, according to new data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the gap between men's and women's median earnings widened slightly between 2007 and 2008, from 78 percent to 77 percent for full-time, year-round workers.

While women have been hard at work to narrow the wage gap, Congress has failed to pass legislation that would give women effective equal pay protections.

Time is running out to get this critical legislation signed into law this year. If the Senate doesn't act soon, we'll have to start all over again in both chambers of the new Congress next year.

We all know that women can't afford to wait for that to happen. That's why AAUW will be turning up the heat in August, telling the Senate to "Get it Done!" and pass the *Paycheck Fairness Act* in September. Even if both of your senators are cosponsors, we urge you to participate in AAUW's "Get it Done!" 21 Days of Action campaign.

All you need to do is go to AAUW's website – *aauw.org* – log into the Member Center and look for the *Two-Minute Activist*. With a few simple clicks, you can notify your members of Congress how you feel about the importance of the passage of this legislation right now!
